Welcome to the latest edition of our Explorer newsletter.

As we near the conclusion of the secondary schools expo season, it's fantastic to witness the good turnout of these events. From the North Shore to West Auckland, Christchurch to Whakatane/Rotorua, these expos have been bustling with enthusiastic attendees.

While we grapple with soaring grocery prices, we acknowledge the challenges you face, including the uncertainties around NCEA changes and the ongoing struggle for improved work conditions for secondary school teachers.

In Term 2, we had the privilege of hosting almost 2,000 secondary school students across all our campuses for enriching experience days. From communication to creative arts, engineering to food technology, STEM & health, and more. Students from the Wellington region participated in the Massey Annual Year Book workshop, refining their communication and creative skills for their school's yearbook. Over 700 Year 12 & 13 students in Auckland attended the NCEA credit-bearing Chemical Cluedo workshops to solve a murder scenario using chemistry and using the state-of-the-art lab equipments.



Massey continues to excel in providing hands-on opportunities for prospective students. What truly sets us apart, in my experience of over 20 years in this field, is the accessibility of our professors to undergraduate students.

They go beyond their research commitments and teaching aspiring scholars and engage with prospective undergraduate students. It's refreshing!

Fieldays is a significant event for us (and politicians), as we recently had the pleasure of presenting careers with a focus on sustainability. It was wonderful to see many schools from Waikato, Auckland, Wairarapa, and Wairiki showing interest in the food and fibre industry.

Our Open Days are just around the corner starting at Manawatū on 2 August, followed by Auckland (on a Friday this year) on the 11th, and concluding at Wellington Campus on the 25th. We will run application and scholarships workshops, and conduct pre-approval portfolio assessments for design and fine arts students at all Open Days.


We encourage your students to attend, even for a just a couple of hours. Stay tuned for a detailed programme of presentations and workshops to plan your visit.

If you have students considering a career in sport and exercise, we are hosting an interactive workshop on the Manawatū campus on Thursday 6 July 2023.





Chemistry Workshop—Who murdered Professor White?

We had the pleasure of hosting over 500 senior students at our Auckland campus for the Chemistry Cluedo workshops which was held at Massey's brand new Innovation Complex. Led by Dr Debbie Jordan and her team from the School of Natural Sciences, a 3-hour spectroscopy workshop was conducted, aligning with an NCEA level 3 achievement standard.

During the workshop, students were presented with a staged murder scene and equipped with advanced equipment and clues to solve the mystery. This hands-on approach provided a fun and practical way for students to grasp the theory behind NCEA Level 3 Spectroscopic Data in Chemistry—timely for the internal assessment in the subject.

Due to the event's success, there are plans to potentially turn it into a competitive activity in 2024. Watch this space!

STUDY AVIATION MANAGEMENT



SAM RAWLINGS, HOWICK COLLEGE—Bachelor of Aviation Management/Master of Aviation

Operations Process Manager—Wellington International Airport

To say that aviation offers varied career opportunities is an understatement in my experience. I was always interested in a career in aviation—especially the operational, logistical and planning areas. From the start of my undergraduate degree I looked for ways to build on this interest, expanding my experience and knowledge at every opportunity, starting off in the industry by working at Auckland International Airport as Passenger Experience Assistant for the 2017/2018 University summer vacation.

During my 3-year undergraduate degree I grabbed every chance to expand my experience and knowledge of this exciting industry, including working part time at Palmerston North Airport, undertaking contract work for an aviation consultant as a Project Assistant/Coordinator assisting with various airport planning projects, and completing the degree's internship courses - where I interned with Tasman Cargo Airlines in Auckland to help supervise the aircraft turnaround process. These roles gave me exposure to a wide range of areas within the industry, as well as some awesome opportunities, such as "Jump-seating" over to Sydney on a Freight aircraft.

In November 2019, I received my first full-time role with Wellington International Airport Limited initially as a Works Safety Officer, while pairing this with further consultancy work before joining Air Chathams as a contracted Ground Handling

and Cargo Agent. I used the Covid-19 Pandemic to complete my Massey University Master's of Aviation degree part-time alongside my work at WIAL, which I completed with Merit. This project paired hand-in-hand with my role at the time, where I investigated the feasibility of operating EV's for Wellington Airport's Airside Operations team, which resulted in the procurement of two Electric MG vehicles. This would help us continue to progress towards our sustainability targets as an organisation of reducing our carbon emissions, along with our operating costs and vehicle maintenance needs.

Over the last three and a half years, I have worked my way up through several roles at WIAL within the Airside Team into the role I hold today of Operations Process Manager. My typical days are never 'typical' or dull, working alongside our key stakeholders, government agencies and aviation service providers. Here I have to assess future requirements to enable the airport to achieve ongoing improvements—including innovative and technological solutions that enhance our operational capabilities/efficiencies.

The Aviation industry really does have roles for everyone, from operations through to marketing, finance, and human resources. You can see that I am passionate about this industry and all that it offers me, and others, by way of national and international opportunities and a diverse and challenging career in such an exciting field.
