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ORCiD ID video released

Subject Librarians recently collaborated with Associate Professor Dr Ruggiero Lovreglio and Susan Mander (Lecturer) from the School of Built Environment to create a short video for the Massey University researcher community that highlights the advantages of having an ORCiD ID. The three-minute video, titled *5 reasons to have an ORCiD*, went live on the University's Mediasite channel in January.

The ORCiD video is linked from our Library webpage on <u>Your researcher</u> <u>profiles</u>, which also has information about creating and updating an ORCiD ID.

Open Access Toolkit for Aotearoa New Zealand Researchers Launched

The Open Access Toolkit for Aotearoa was officially launched on 16th February at an online event hosted by <u>Open Access Australasia</u>. This resource is designed specifically for the Aotearoa research community and guides them through making their journal articles Open Access.

The toolkit is a product of a collaborative project team that included representatives from all NZ universities, with Lyndall Holstein, Health Librarian, representing Massey University.

New Open Access agreement signed

Massey University has signed a new Read and Publish agreement for 2024 with the American Psychological Association (APA). This provides the Institution's authors with uncapped open access publishing in APA's 87 hybrid journals with no charge. Eligible article types are research and review articles. CC-BY is the default license option.

The Council of Australian University Librarians (CAUL) has issued a <u>press release</u> with further details about the agreement with APA. An alphabetical list of Massey's Read & Publish Agreements is located on the <u>Library Website</u>.

Compulsory textbooks relocated

Compulsory textbooks have been removed from short-loan collections and returned to the main collection at each library to increase their availability for circulation. A <u>Library out Loud</u> blog post describes the student use outcomes of the 2023 review of the Library's approach to textbooks.

Note that electronic textbooks with additional content provided online via a code for each user, such as some Cengage textbooks, cannot be supported by a Library copy. These are designed by the publishers for individual purchase and use only. We encourage academic staff to talk with their subject librarian about textbook choices.
