# BACHELOR OF ARTS BA

You get to focus on exactly what you enjoy, while learning to be a creative and independent thinker. You'll also get the valuable skills today's employers are looking for.

## QUALIFICATION OVERVIEW

The Bachelor of Arts degree consists of 360 credits (24 papers) studied over a period of at least three years of full-time study or a longer period of part-time study.

This includes:

- > Five core papers, three of which are taken in your first year of study
  - > Nine papers in your major subject, or eight papers in each subject if you choose a double major
  - > Five papers in your minor subject – you can include up to two minors.
- The remaining papers which make up the BA are called elective papers. Some elective papers can be from other undergraduate degrees.

During your first year, you can select a broad range of subjects which interest you.

## THE NEW CORE CURRICULUM

Last year we asked hundreds of employers and Massey graduates about the value of a BA. Based on what we heard, we decided to refresh our degree and include a new core curriculum. This core will:

- > Provide transferable skills that will equip you for any career path you choose to follow
- > Be intellectually stimulating
- > Give shape to your degree and introduce you to the richness of diverse subjects available to you
- > Complement the study you will do in major(s) and/or minor(s)
- > Help you make sense of and engage with the wider world in which you live
- > Still allow for freedom of choice and flexibility within your degree.



## MAJORS AND MINORS

The BA offers you the opportunity to specialise in majors and minors in the subjects listed on the right. All subjects available as majors in Massey University's BA degree are also available as minor subjects, except for Business Psychology. You can also study minors from the Bachelor of Business Studies or the Bachelor of Science. It is recommended that all students include a minor subject in their BA.

All BA majors require nine papers, including at least one 100-level paper, two 200-level papers and four 300-level papers. All BA minors require five papers, including three papers above 100-level, with at least one paper at 300-level. There are required papers in some majors and some minors, so when selecting your major and your minor, please read the regulations for those subjects carefully.

Massey's BA(BusPsych) draws on leading expertise from business and psychology to set you apart from the rest. Its taught in collaboration by psychology and business lecturers and applies psychology to the world of business to develop your understanding of how people affect, and are affected by, organisational culture, human resources and management. Your understanding of human attitude and behaviour will be a distinct advantage in your ability to drive business growth.

#### WHERE DO I START?

##### 175.101 Psychology as a Social Science

An introduction to psychology as the scientific study of human behaviour, with emphasis on individual differences and social influences. The paper aims to develop an awareness of the issues, terminology, methods, and techniques involved in the study of human behaviour.

##### 175.102 Psychology as a Natural Science

An introduction to methods and findings from the scientific study of psychology and its application to everyday human behaviour. Examination of basic behavioural, perceptual, and cognitive processes, and how these are influenced by biological mechanisms and cultural context.

## CHINESE

### A major of the BA

#### BA LEADER IN THE WORLD'S GLOBAL MARKETPLACE.

Understanding the language and culture of China can unlock the door to a lifetime of exciting careers

#### WHAT'S IT LIKE?

Here and abroad, the relationship between China and New Zealand grows stronger every year. As a core global player at the hub of the Asia-Pacific region, China is a leader in overseas relations. Meanwhile, New Zealand is home to many ethnic Chinese. Understanding Chinese culture and language is helpful for establishing careers, from foreign diplomacy to business and finance.

#### WHY MASSEY?

##### RELEVANT IN AUSTRALASIAN CONTEXTS

We recognise that the increasingly multicultural nature of society means it is not only important to learn about new languages and cultures, it is also important to learn how these languages and cultures interact with, and are affected by, your own. Our programme produces its own digital study materials, relevant to our Australasian students to ensure that you gain skills that are applicable to your own communities.

##### HIGHLY INTERACTIVE

The Chinese programme offers Chinese language papers that range from beginners through to advanced. No knowledge of the Chinese language is necessary in order to enrol in the beginners' papers.

Whether you study on campus or by distance, you will learn from supportive, passionate academics who produce digital study materials complete with exercises, audio, videos and presentations; and deliver live online tutorials/lectures at various times – evenings, lunch times and weekends – to fit with busy schedules. They ensure that you don't have to learn on your own and that everyone can practise speaking Chinese in a shared environment.

##### COMBINES CHINESE CULTURE AND LANGUAGE

Language does not exist in isolation, and we believe it becomes more powerful when it is learnt in a cultural context. To guide this understanding, we use videos, music and literature to explore social, historical and political developments. Through exploring this context, you will also explore your own culture and identity.

#### CAREER OPPORTUNITIES

More and more skilled graduates in Chinese are needed to work in areas like:

- > Diplomacy
- > Health care
- > International business
- > Secondary teaching
- > Tourism
- > Immigration and customs
- > Foreign affairs

Students who plan careers in these areas are encouraged to include Chinese in their degree in order to have a competitive edge in the job market.

#### WHERE DO I START?

You start with one of the language papers. There is one specifically for complete beginners, and another for students with some limited knowledge. There is a third paper at 100-level that introduces you to Chinese culture.

##### 241.101 Chinese 1A

The paper provides the students with a basic proficiency in Putonghua (Mandarin). The students acquire the phonetics, knowledge of a set of characters, and the vocabulary and constructions in the first third of Chinese Link Level I.

##### 241.102 Chinese 1B

The paper builds on the proficiency in Putonghua (Mandarin) that is developed in 241.101 Chinese 1A. The students continue to acquire the phonetics, a further set of characters, and the vocabulary and constructions in the second third of Chinese Link Level I.

##### 241.103 Chinese Cultural World

An enquiry into Chinese culture through the medium of texts, literature, film, and the arts. No knowledge of Chinese is required.

With a BA (Classical Studies) at Massey you will study the past, understand the present and help build the world of tomorrow.

### WHAT'S IT LIKE?

#### GAIN A DEEP UNDERSTANDING OF 21ST-CENTURY CULTURE

Knowledge of ancient Greece and Rome is essential for an understanding of our own modern civilization. Through their language, philosophy, science, medicine, law, political institutions, art and architecture, the Greeks and Romans had a profound and lasting influence on world culture. They also created and developed nearly every genre of Western literature.

Classical studies allows you to trace meaningful connections between classical antiquity and our own 21st century civilization.

### WHY MASSEY?

#### YOU CHOOSE WHAT YOU STUDY

Classical studies is by its very nature interdisciplinary, which means that you can study what you enjoy, and explore subject areas that spark your interest. You can explore the classical world from many angles: literature, history, art, mythology, religion, war, even love and sexuality.

#### FOLLOW YOUR PASSION AND ENHANCE YOUR FUTURE

With a Massey BA (Classical Studies), not only can you take a variety of papers to suit your interests, but you will also acquire and develop a diverse range of skills. Our evidence for the ancient world is challenging; it is sometimes fragmentary, sometimes obscure, often biased or distorted. At Massey you will make sense of it through argument and interpretation.

### WHERE DO I START?

You can begin your major by choosing from a range of 100-level papers in Classical Studies. These papers cover areas like Greek history and mythology, early Rome, Latin language, and war, sport, and entertainment in ancient Greece and Rome. Not all the 100-level papers are offered each year, so make sure you select your first-year papers from those available in the year you want to begin your major.



Examining the contemporary world of modern defence – including its impact on media, technology and conflict resolution at local and global levels – is the core of this specialised major. Massey University is the only university in Australasia where you can study defence studies in an undergraduate degree.

Massey's BA(DefStuds) is designed in collaboration with an advisory board of New Zealand's top defence and security officials. You may have the opportunity to do an internship with Government agencies such as the New Zealand Defence Force.

# ECONOMICS

## A major of the BA



### THERE'S MORE TO ECONOMICS THAN THE BASICS OF FOOD, SHELTER, AND CLOTHING

From big picture world economics to the juggling act of domestic house-keeping, a major in economics is right on the money.

### WHAT'S IT LIKE?

The study of economics makes sense of why and how people manage resources and finances, from subsistence living to advanced economies. It offers ways of thinking about the world, enabling us to make the best of what we have, and how to improve on it.

### WHERE DO I START?

You will begin your major in economics with two 100-level papers: Economics and Principles of Macroeconomics. Both these papers are compulsory. Supporting papers in mathematics or statistics are also useful in your first year. You then move to the 200-level papers by studying Intermediate Macroeconomics and Intermediate Microeconomics. You can structure the rest of your major around your particular interests, whether it's international trade, resource and environmental economics, financial economics, or public policy.

#### 115.106 Economics

An introduction to the economic analysis of markets, with emphasis on the behaviour of individuals, firms, and government. The framework developed is used to analyse and evaluate contemporary economic policies in both New Zealand and international contexts.

#### 178.100 Principles of Macroeconomics

Introduces the principles of macroeconomics. The paper provides students with an understanding of economic activities at the level of the industry, the country, and at the international level. Topics include national income accounting, inflation, unemployment, the role of the government in the economy, stabilisation policies, and the international economy.

A critical examination of social, cultural, political, historical, and philosophical influences on the development of education in Aotearoa/ New Zealand and internationally.

##### 275.102 Human Development

An introduction to the study of life-span human development and learning within changing social and physical contexts.

#### THINKING OF MOVING ON TO TEACHING?

As part of your BA (Education), we strongly recommend that you include literacy and numeracy papers too, as these are requirements when applying for our Graduate Diploma in Teaching or Master of Teaching and Learning programmes.

## A major of the BA

### LEARN, DEVELOP, ACHIEVE

With a Massey BA (Educational Psychology), you will become involved with the understanding and promotion of learning and development.

### WHAT'S IT LIKE?

Educational psychology explores lifelong ako (learning and teaching) through an understanding of cultural, cognitive, social, behavioural and emotional aspects of learners and teachers.

It encompasses:

- > The application of Western and Māori psychological knowledge in education and human development
- > A science that seeks to understand, and an art that seeks to apply those understandings in the real world, to help learners realise their potential. You will learn about the complex relationships between learners and their environment. You can choose from a wide range of papers that reflect the diversity of psychology and education.

You'll consider things like:

- > How can we make learning more effective?
- > What are the social mediators of thinking, learning and development?
- > How can teachers best meet the learning needs of a diversity of learners?
- > What factors help ensure educational success?
- > How do we support development of positive behaviours for learning?
- > How do we reduce learning difficulties?
- > How do we best support learners with disabilities?

Educational psychology looks at what supports and hinders learning, and informs policy and practice in education systems. You'll also develop transferable skills that include research, analysis, communication and problem-solving.

An introduction to methods and findings from the scientific study of psychology and its application to everyday human behaviour. Examination of basic behavioural, perceptual, and cognitive processes and how these are influenced by biological mechanisms and cultural context.

An introduction to the study of life-span human development and learning within changing social and physical contexts.

When you take environmental studies at Massey, you will explore the dynamic relationship between human society and our environment. It's a relationship that is always changing. You will learn to think critically and understand the big picture, rather than seeing environmental questions simply as problems that can be solved easily with a technological fix.

### WHY MASSEY?

#### TAILOR A DEGREE THAT'S JUST FOR YOU

With a BA (Environmental Studies), you can choose to explore almost anything to do with the environment, from a scientific, social, cultural or economic point of view. You can also bring together papers from a range of disciplines to create a degree just for you. Your major starts with the paper Society, Environment and Place, which introduces you to the diversity of human geography. From there you build up your knowledge by looking at New Zealand environmental issues, then moving on to a paper such as Sociology of the Environment.

### WHERE DO I START?

#### 145.111 Society, Environment and Place

An introduction to the diversity of human geography. Three themes are selected from the following: local-global connections; geography of leisure and consumption; political geography; sustainable development.

#### 176.102 New Zealand Society

Completing a 100-level sociology paper is a prerequisite for the 200-level compulsory paper 176.206. This 100-level paper should be taken in first year.

### CAREER OPPORTUNITIES

Our society is becoming more environmentally aware and career opportunities in this area are growing. Many local and national government agencies are employing people to focus specifically on aspects of the environment and how it can be preserved, including:

- > Allocation of water resources
- > Ecological restoration

Extramural study has given me the flexibility of living in Australia and New Zealand and working my study around raising a young family. An environmental studies major is a fascinating mix of both social science and science papers which emphasises the importance of examining the big picture when it comes to environmental issues. With New Zealand and the world facing serious issues of declining biodiversity and degraded waterways and soils, there is no time like the present to study this fascinating subject.

I can strongly recommend doing environmental studies at Massey. The papers I have done have been taught by friendly and approachable lecturers who are truly passionate about their subjects. In stage one of the BA Geography, you will study both human and physical geography.

- > Human geography looks at how space, place and landscape are both the condition and consequence of social processes;
- > Physical geography looks at how natural landscapes take shape and change.

You will gain a solid foundation to understand the world as the product of a combination of social and natural processes.

### WHY MASSEY?

With a history major you have an opportunity to shape your degree around your interests. The breadth of papers offered allows you to explore your own particular interests and will give you a broad and well-rounded major.

I chose to study history because I wanted to be a high school teacher initially. I had always enjoyed the subject and I was good at it, so it was an obvious choice for me. When I subsequently decided I did not want to pursue teaching, my Arts degree gave me a broad platform from which to explore other potential career paths.

#### GAIN FASCINATING INSIGHTS INTO JAPAN'S RICH CULTURE AND HISTORY

Let your love of languages give you an edge in the international job market.

#### WHAT'S IT LIKE?

The Japanese major equips students with advanced language skills in spoken and written Japanese, coupled with a solid understanding of the cultural background underpinning this complex and powerful society. You'll also learn about the interaction between Japanese and New Zealand culture, for example the role Japan plays in foreign trade.

With your major in Japanese, you can expect to acquire competence equivalent to at least Level Two of the Japanese Language Proficiency Test (Nihongo Noryoku Shiken). Each language paper builds upon the previous one, so if you have studied some Japanese previously please contact the programme coordinator for advice on the appropriate entry level.

#### WHY MASSEY?

##### RELEVANT IN AUSTRALASIAN CONTEXTS

We recognise that the increasingly multicultural nature of society means it is not only important to learn about new languages and cultures, it is also important to learn how these languages and cultures interact with, and are affected by, your own. Our programme produces its own digital study materials, relevant to Australasian students, to ensure that you gain skills that are applicable to your own communities.

##### HIGHLY INTERACTIVE

Whether you study on campus or by distance, you will learn from supportive, passionate academics who produce digital study materials complete with exercises, audio, videos and presentations; and deliver live online tutorials/lectures at various times – evenings, lunch times and weekends – to fit with busy schedules. Students learn romanised script, the two phonetic scripts (hiragana and katakana), and approximately 60 Japanese characters (kanji), as well as basic sentence structures and vocabulary useful for everyday life in Japan.

##### 242.102 Japanese 1B

This paper builds on the introductory-level proficiency in Japanese established in 242.101 Japanese 1A, developing further basic competence in Japanese listening, speaking, reading and writing skills. An additional 87 kanji are learnt. An increased range of sentence structures and vocabulary useful for everyday situations and interactions in Japan is introduced.

##### 242.103 Introduction to Japanese Culture

An overview of the cultural development of Japan from early times to the present.

As the new New Zealand emerges, language remains the most powerful tool for connecting with and understanding our evolving diversity of people and cultures. Whether you're intrigued by the role of language in forensic situations, digital communities, social media, mother-tongue maintenance, or second-language learning, we have a variety of papers on offer. Our papers are taught by lecturers who are leading in a range of distinctive research areas.

### WHERE DO I START?

You can begin your major by taking 100-level papers in a number of subjects like language studies, communication, and culture. We don't offer all our 100-level papers every year so make sure you choose papers on offer the year you want to start your major.

### EVER WONDERED WHAT MAKES AOTEAROA NEW ZEALAND THE COUNTRY WE CALL HOME?

Where did our culture(s) come from? What are the events that have shaped our history? A good place to start is Māori Studies.

Māori language, society, and culture are a rich, vibrant, and dynamic part of Aotearoa New Zealand, and provide much of its uniqueness. An understanding of Māori language and culture is fundamental in order to shape the social, political, and economic future of our proud nation. Kia kaha Aotearoa!

### WHAT'S IT LIKE?

A Māori Studies major will give you a good grounding in your understanding of te ao Māori (the Māori world).

Our Māori language papers will help to build up your knowledge of te reo until you are a competent, if not fluent, speaker.

Other study areas in this major include Māori visual arts, Aotearoa heritage, Māori policy and development, and Māori health. Together, these will give you a sound understanding of Māori culture and society.

### WHERE DO I START?

You can begin your major by choosing from a number of 100-level papers in Māori Studies. Papers cover areas like language, visual art, and custom and lore. We offer two 100-level language papers: 150.110 is for beginners and 150.111 is for students who already have some experience learning the language.

If you already have some knowledge of the Māori language, contact the programme coordinator before you decide to take language papers. This is to make sure you begin your studies at the most appropriate level for you.

The only compulsory paper in the major is the advanced language paper. This way we can make sure by the time you finish your major in Māori Studies you are confident speaking te reo.

# MATHEMATICS

## A major of the BA



### NOT MANY AREAS OF HUMAN ENDEAVOUR HAVE BEEN UNTOUCHED BY MATHEMATICS

The task of the mathematician is to find ways to collect appropriate data for analysis and problem solving.

### WHAT'S IT LIKE?

Mathematics draws much of its following and strength from the ability to find solutions for a wide variety of problems from within other disciplines, such as engineering, commerce and industry. Choosing mathematics as your major opens up a world of opportunity.

Your mathematics major will help you develop a wide variety of skills and techniques, especially in calculus and algebra. You will learn to formulate, solve, restate, resolve and interpret problems. Alongside these analytical skills you will also build up your knowledge of computational simulation techniques on computers.

### WHERE DO I START?

You begin your study with two introductory mathematics papers. These are calculus and linear mathematics. The more advanced mathematics papers build on the basic concepts you learn in the two 100-level papers.

If you do not have NCEA Level 3 Mathematics you should take 160.103 prior to enrolment into 160.111 and 160.112.

#### 160.111 Mathematics 1A

This paper provides a solid mathematical foundation for further studies in mathematics, science and engineering. It consolidates basic concepts and introduces more advanced material on differentiation and numerical techniques, enabling the formation of mathematical models of real-world problems. The paper blends topics from calculus with those from linear algebra and includes matrices, linear equations, vectors and geometry.

#### 160.112 Mathematics 1B

This paper builds on the foundation provided by 160.111. Together these papers provide a mathematical platform for more advanced studies in mathematics, science and engineering. The topics are a blend of calculus and linear algebra, including complex numbers, linear transformations, eigenvectors, advanced techniques of integration, differential equations and applications.

### WHAT'S IT LIKE?

Media studies is an exciting discipline, which will prepare students for future challenges in an information-rich society. Media studies seeks to analyse and understand the production, consumption and content of a range of media including film, social media, television, popular music and smartphones. Students will explore the formal characteristics of these media and their social, cultural, political and economic implications. Media studies is taught through an innovative programme that blends theory with creative practice. The skills that students will develop throughout their study are versatile and highly sought-after in many careers, with digital literacy becoming increasingly important across all sectors.

### WHY MASSEY?

We don't offer all our 100-level papers every year, so make sure you choose your first-year papers from the ones available at your campus.

When I first started at Massey I wasn't completely sure what to study but knew that I had enjoyed Media Studies at secondary school. I soon learned that a Bachelor of Arts majoring in Media Studies would enable me to develop knowledge in the areas that I was truly passionate about while also providing me with a meaningful and useful tertiary education. Along the way there were highlights, especially as the papers progress through the higher levels. Trauma and the Media (amongst other media theory papers) both challenged me and demonstrated how our understanding of the world is massively affected by the evolving relationship between media and mankind.

I was also given the chance to get hold of a camera on practical media papers. The knowledge I picked up on these papers enabled me to now run my own film production business, without having to attend a specialist filmmaking school. 'Howie Shoot Pictures' specialises in promotional videos for small businesses, or not-for-profits. My clients will often come to me with a video purpose or goal, and I take it from there. However, looking back it was the versatility of the BA that I continue to find most valuable. In my current position as Communications Coordinator for the Wellington City Mission, the papers in Communications, Te Reo, Business Studies, Politics and especially English (my minor) are particularly relevant. Also, throughout my degree I learnt how to present and structure an original argument in a professional manner – so much so, that it is second nature to me now. I am responsible for, or have a role in, most official communications the Wellington City Mission has with the public, including our quarterly newsletter and campaign and appeal literature.

### THINK DEEPLY ABOUT THE BIG QUESTIONS

If you are fascinated by the big questions of what kind of beings we are, and how we interact with the world in which we live, then a BA in philosophy is right for you.

### WHAT'S IT LIKE?

A Massey BA (Philosophy) will develop your abilities to think and reason, to express your thoughts clearly and concisely, and to critically evaluate complex ideas, all of which will make you a highly employable graduate.

### WHY MASSEY?

#### MAKE YOUR POINT AND INFLUENCE PEOPLE

Philosophy isn't just about abstract thinking. Massey's BA (Philosophy) offers you the chance to learn highly applicable and useful skills. Studying philosophy develops your critical thinking skills: your ability to assess whether arguments are rationally compelling, and to make your arguments compelling to others.

You will also learn how to express your thoughts concisely and clearly, how to engage constructively in debate, how to deal with unusual and difficult ideas, and how to look at problems in new ways.

#### BENEFIT AT WORK AND AT HOME

The intellectual skill of critical thinking is important in the workplace, and is consistently ranked by employers amongst the most desirable attributes in an employee. Effective critical thinking skills help you in your day-to-day life too, such as when watching the news or reading stories on the internet. Through your study of philosophy you will learn how to understand and evaluate what you read rather than just remembering it, and to become more aware of the reasons why you hold the views you do. A major in philosophy will challenge your thinking and encourage you to continue asking questions.

#### LEARN FROM LEADING PHILOSOPHERS

At Massey you'll be taught by some of the world's leading philosophers such as Bill Fish. An associate professor at Massey University, Bill's main areas of research and teaching are on disjunctivism – what it is to have a mind, how it hooks up to the world, the role of consciousness in all of this and epistemology (the theory around how we come to have knowledge). In 2012 his book was a topic of discussion at a meeting of the biggest philosophy association in the world.

### WHERE DO I START?

You will begin your major by choosing from a number of 100-level papers. These papers cover areas like critical thinking, great philosophers, questions of knowledge and reality, religion, and ethics. We are not able to offer all our 100-level papers every year, so make sure you select from those available in the year you want to start your major.

### CAREER OPPORTUNITIES

A Massey BA (Philosophy) gives you experience in handling unusual and difficult ideas, communicating your thinking with clarity, and being aware of the reasons for your views while being flexible and adaptive. You will cope with new challenges as the needs of your work change. That adaptability and the ability to think on your feet will be a big advantage in careers in advertising, journalism, management, policy analysis, research and many more.

Studying a BA politics at Massey equips you with the concepts, theories and facts you need to make sense of the world around you.

### WHAT'S IT LIKE?

Politics is about contestations for power and how we make decisions in society – who gets what, when and how – from the local community to the nation and internationally.

Politics is concerned with the conflict of ideas and values. It has to do with who governs, and how and why decisions that affect all of us (such as how much students should pay to study at university or whether the UN should sanction military interventions) are made.

### WHY MASSEY?

#### A WIDE RANGE OF TOPICS

With Massey's BA (Politics), you may study topics such as how laws are made in New Zealand, what the rise of China means for the future of global politics, how Select Committees work, what is happening in the Palestine/Israel conflict, or what concepts such as "freedom" or "justice" mean to different people. You might also learn about the main dimensions of key contemporary international conflicts.

#### INTERACTIVE CLASSES AND ENTHUSIASTIC LECTURERS

At Massey, politics is taught in a small interdisciplinary programme where you have regular and close contact with academic staff. Your lecturers are active researchers in their respective fields. They are passionate about the subject matter they teach and bring that enthusiasm to the classroom.

#### 200.161 Introduction to Politics

An introduction to the study and nature of politics, including political theory, political parties, electoral systems, public policy and international relations.

Do you wonder how the brain works, and want to understand how we think, behave and make decisions? Then a BA Psychology could be for you.

### WHAT'S IT LIKE?

Psychology is dedicated to the promotion of human welfare. It explores the thoughts, feelings and actions of individuals and groups in a social and cultural context. The goal of psychology is to understand, describe and predict behaviour. From a broader perspective, psychology helps us make sense of human impact on the world in which we live. At Massey, you can choose from a wide range of papers that reflect the diversity of psychology. You'll learn about the natural, social and biological side as well as research methods and applications of psychology.

### PSYCHOLOGY COMBINES:

- > Natural science, focusing on perception, cognition, learning and the biological bases of behaviour;
- > Social science, dealing with emotions, individual differences, behaviour and relationships and the wider social context.

### QUESTIONS PSYCHOLOGISTS ASK INCLUDE:

- > How do people perceive, learn, think, develop, behave and relate to each other?
- > How does the structure of the brain affect behaviour?
- > What makes people different from each other?

- > How does being in groups affect people's behaviours; how do social groups affect what we do?

#### 175.101 Psychology as a Social Science

An introduction to psychology as the scientific study of human behaviour, with emphasis on individual differences and social influences. The paper aims to develop an awareness of the issues, terminology,

methods, and techniques involved in the study of human behaviour.

#### 175.102 Psychology as a Natural Science

An introduction to methods and findings from the scientific study of psychology and its application to everyday human behaviour. Examination of basic behavioural, perceptual and cognitive processes and how these are influenced by biological mechanisms and cultural context.

### CAREER OPPORTUNITIES

A major in Psychology can provide knowledge and skills relevant to pursuing a broad selection of applied psychology areas including clinical, health, education, community, industrial and organisational psychology. The contemporary environment provides numerous complex and multifaceted challenges to security (human, environmental and economic) that will undoubtedly continue in the future. These challenges include not only traditional interstate conflict, but also the potential threat of the spread of nuclear weapons, issues such as internecine disputes linked to religious differences, the control over and exploitation of scarce resources, and the impact of globalisation and environmental change.

#### 149.180 Introduction to Security Studies

This paper introduces the key aspects of Security Studies. The nature of global security issues will

be considered, but with a particular emphasis on New Zealand, and with reference to knowledge of the various approaches, challenges, participants and policies/practices involved.

### WHAT'S IT LIKE?

If you are fascinated by how and why power, resources and opportunities are distributed within society, then Massey's BA (Social Policy) is for you.

You will gain an understanding of the political, economic, social and cultural factors that influence the development, implementation and evaluation of social policy in Aotearoa New Zealand.

You will study law, politics, and the roles of central and local government in a democratic society. This will lead to insights into the relationship between the state, political parties, the judiciary, the legal system, and the public in shaping legislation and developing policy.

### WHERE DO I START?

#### 279.101 Social Policy: An Introduction

An introduction to Social Policy with particular relevance to the history and patterns of social and economic development in New Zealand

#### 200.162 Politics and Public Policy in New Zealand

A foundation study of policy studies in the New Zealand context, with particular emphasis on public policy, the nature of politics and models of political economy

AND

#### 178.100 Principles of Macroeconomics

Introduces the principles of macroeconomics. The paper provides students with an understanding of economic activities at the

level of the industry, the country and at the international level. Topics include national income accounting, inflation, unemployment, the role of the government in the economy, stabilisation policies and the international economy

OR

#### 178.110 The New Zealand Economy

An introduction to the development and structure of the economy of New Zealand, with emphasis on actual issues and policies. International influences from a New Zealand perspective.

### CAREER OPPORTUNITIES

Your BA (Social Policy) will give you the knowledge and competencies you need to start your career as a policy analyst and researcher. You will learn a range of intellectual and practical skills that will stand you in good stead in the job market.

This qualification opens up a world of opportunity to be involved in influencing a broad number of social issue outcomes (eg healthy housing, youth development, Maori wellbeing, health promotion, gender analysis of policy), not only from a Government-down position, but also from an individual-, community- and society-up perspective.

You will learn to apply your critical social policy analysis skills to a number of decision-making scenarios to result in better social outcomes.

This decision-making can take many forms including a policy, project plan, submission, or even the strategic direction of an organisation.

### ■ DONNA MORGAN

I used to spend many a day getting infuriated about events that I saw on TV, read in the news, or just saw with my own eyes as being unjust or inequitable. So I enrolled in the BA in Social Policy with the aims of hoping to understand what causes some groups of people to become marginalised in our society, and what I could do to help change it.

I studied a range of topics from politics, economics, the environment. I also discovered a whole lot about myself and how some policies have shaped my life. I moved into areas concerning youth wellbeing, in particular issues related to their education and disengagement from mainstream and youth unemployment. I am currently working with a small community group who are hoping to develop an initiative to help transition youth into work, to support and mentor them, and to offer practical support and advice to employers who employ them.

# SPANISH

## A major of the BA

### DISCOVER SPANISH LANGUAGE, CULTURE AND HERITAGE. BOOST YOUR CAREER PROSPECTS WHILE LEARNING ABOUT A NEW CULTURE

With more than 400 million speakers, Spanish is one of the most widely spoken languages in the world and continues to grow as a popular second language. Spanish is spoken not only in Spain, but also in more than 20 countries in Latin America, parts of Africa, and in many regions of the United States. Alongside the language is a vibrant and captivating cultural heritage, which New Zealanders are beginning to discover and appreciate more fully through our growing relationships with Latin American countries.

### WHY MASSEY?

#### RELEVANT IN AUSTRALASIAN CONTEXTS

We recognise that the increasingly multicultural nature of society means it is not only important to learn about new languages and cultures, it is also important to learn how these languages and cultures interact with, and are affected by, your own. Our programme produces its own digital study materials, relevant to Australasian students, to ensure that you gain skills that are applicable to your own communities. Massey is New Zealand's only university to deliver language programmes completely via distance, including Spanish offshore to Australian students.

### HIGHLY INTERACTIVE

Whether you study on campus or by distance, you will learn from supportive, passionate academics who produce digital study materials complete with exercises, audio, videos and presentations; and deliver live online tutorials/lectures at various times – evenings, lunch times and weekends – to fit with busy schedules. They ensure that you don't have to learn on your own

and that everyone can practise speaking Spanish in a shared environment.

### COMBINES CULTURE AND LANGUAGE

Language does not exist in isolation, and we believe it becomes more powerful when it is learnt in a cultural context. To guide this understanding, we use videos, music and literature to explore social, historical and political developments. Through exploring this context, you will also explore your own culture and identity.

### WHERE DO I START?

You can begin your major in Spanish with our 100-level papers. There are two papers designed to introduce you to the Spanish language, one for complete beginners and the other for students with limited knowledge. A third paper introduces you to Hispanic culture.

#### 245.101 Introductory Spanish Language I (complete beginners)

Development of basic communication skills in spoken and written Spanish through use of DVD, reading, comprehension, structural exercises and oral practice. Aspects of contemporary Hispanic culture and society are also studied. An oral examination forms part of the final assessment.

#### 245.102 Introductory Spanish Language II (limited knowledge)

Extension of basic communication skills in spoken and written Spanish through use of DVD, composition, comprehension, and oral practice for students with an initial knowledge of Spanish. Aspects of contemporary Hispanic culture and society are also studied. An oral examination forms part of the final assessment.

#### 245.103 Hispanic Culture and Heritage

An introduction to the main aspects of modern Hispanic history, literature, art and culture in Spain and the Spanish-speaking world. No prior knowledge of Spanish is required.

If you already have some knowledge of the Spanish language, contact the programme coordinator before you decide to take language papers. This is to make sure you begin your studies at the most appropriate level for you.

## A major of the BA

### BIG DATA = MORE JOBS FOR STATISTICIANS

The explosion of information and data available to the world has made those who can interpret it indispensable. Big Data has opened up a huge range of career opportunities for those who are talented in working with figures.

### WHAT'S IT LIKE?

#### IT'S A GREAT TIME TO BE A STATISTICIAN!

The Wall Street Journal said in 2013 that "Data Crunchers [are] Now the Cool Kids on Campus".

### GET A HIGHLY SOUGHT-AFTER QUALIFICATION

Statistics is really the science of evidence. It allows us to quantify risk and make effective decisions even when we are uncertain about the world around us. Should I buy or sell my stock? Is this new treatment effective against breast cancer? What adverts should my website display in order to increase my revenue? How can I better interpret that weak distress signal coming from a vessel far out at sea?

Seeking answers to questions like these from the recent explosion in digital data makes statisticians some of the most highly sought-after employees.

### WHY MASSEY?

#### LEARN THE THEORY AND ITS PRACTICAL RELEVANCE

As a Massey BA (Statistics) student you will learn the key theories of statistics, but you will also learn the quantitative skills to conduct robust statistical analysis, that is effective in the real world.

The extra quantitative skills that you gain from a statistics major can set you apart from other graduates when applying for jobs.

### WHERE DO I START?

#### 160.111 Mathematics 1A

This paper provides a solid mathematical foundation for further studies in mathematics, science and engineering. It consolidates basic concepts and introduces more advanced material on differentiation and numerical techniques, enabling the formation of mathematical models of real-world problems. The paper blends topics from calculus with those from linear algebra and includes matrices, linear equations, vectors and geometry.

Compulsory paper options are:

#### 161.120 Introductory Statistics

Applied statistics with some emphasis on the social sciences. Exploratory data analysis. Surveys and experiments. Elementary probability and sampling variability. Inference for means, proportions, contingency tables and regression.

OR

#### 161.130 Introductory Biostatistics

Applied statistics with emphasis on biology. Exploratory data analysis. Surveys and experiments. Elementary probability and sampling variability. Inference for means, proportions, contingency tables and regression.



### CAREER OPPORTUNITIES

Statistics skills can be applied in almost any industry. Many jobs not necessarily classified as statisticians are still working in the field, requiring statistics expertise.

With this minor, you'll be able to frame the debate and direct your organisation's communication towards the realisation of its vision. You'll engage in an intensive analysis of public and professional writing styles and literacies, and practise writing for both digital and print environments and explore areas such as writing for the public, online publishing, technical writing and creative non-fiction.

## THEATRE STUDIES \*SUBJECT TO CUAP APPROVAL

This exciting applied theatre and performing arts course combines theatre for social change with real-world communication techniques. A minor in theatre studies will develop your acting, directing, teamwork, event management and playmaking skills. You'll be challenged to think critically, write powerfully and learn how to produce compelling creative performances.

## REHABILITATION STUDIES

Rehabilitation is the process of active change for individuals who have become debilitated through disease or injury. The study of rehabilitation revolves around acquiring the knowledge and skills to achieve optimal physical, psychological and social function. The goal of rehabilitation is for the individual to return to independent functioning within their home and community.

## WOMEN'S STUDIES

Women's Studies looks at the roles and experiences of women, their position in society and culture, now and historically. It also explores perspectives on women's gender and sexuality. This area of academic study offers students a wide-ranging grounding in feminist social theory and research methods.

You also have the option of selecting a minor from the Bachelor of Business Studies or Bachelor of Science degree. All of the minors available in the BBS and the BSc are also available for BA students.

More and more New Zealand employers are seeking graduates with an understanding of business alongside the knowledge and skills of either an arts or science discipline.

Massey's College of Humanities and Social Sciences recognises this and offers two conjoint degrees: the Bachelor of Arts/Bachelor of Business Studies and the Bachelor of Arts Studies/Bachelor of Science.

These conjoint degrees meet the needs of employers and students looking for a combination of knowledge and skills to pursue a career and make a contribution as a global citizen, with additional strengths in business or science.

### QUALIFICATION OVERVIEW

The BA/BBS and BA/BSc conjoint degrees let you graduate with both degrees at the end of four years of full-time study. You must study for both degrees concurrently. To remain in the qualification, you must maintain a Grade Point Average of at least 4.0 (a B- grade) each year.

### PLANNING YOUR DEGREE

In your first year, you should include:

BA/BBS: Four core BBS papers; four BA papers including two core papers and two major papers (or one major paper and one minor paper).

BA/BSc: Four BA papers including two core papers and two major papers (or one major paper and one minor paper); four BSc papers including two major papers.

In your second year, you will need to complete nine papers so that you have passed a total of 255 credits by the end of the year. Your credits should be evenly spread across the two components, and you should ensure that you have completed the three 100-level core papers in the BA, and about half of the papers for your major subject.

In your third year, you will need to complete a further nine papers, all of which should be at 200- or 300-level, and should include the 200-level core paper in the BA component. In your fourth year, you will complete the final 120 credits for the conjoint degree.

### DEGREE STRUCTURE

- > You will need to pass at least 510 credits, made up of at least 255 credits from the BA schedule (the BA component) AND at least 255 credits from the BBS OR BSc schedules (the BBS or BSc component).
- > For the BA component of either programme, you will need to complete the five core papers and the majoring requirements for at least one subject (Business Psychology is not available as a major in the conjoint programme) and 30 credits in a second subject at 200-level.
- > For the BBS component of the BA/BBS, you will need to complete the eight core papers and the majoring requirements of at least one subject. You must include no more than 135 credits at 100-level and at least 60 credits at 300-level in your BBS component.
- > For the BSc component of the BA/BSc, you will need to complete the majoring requirements of at least one subject, and 30 credits in a second subject at 200 level.

### CAREER OPPORTUNITIES

Employment opportunities are going from strength to strength for students who have developed capacities in enquiry, analysis and communication, as well as an understanding of human behaviour, society and the environment. By combining a BA with a BBS or BSc, you'll enhance your competitive edge in the job market. You'll have a deep understanding of people and the wider national and international communities in which they live, coupled with the knowledge and astuteness necessary for business success, or the analytical and conceptual skills valued in the scientific world.

The certificate is an introductory course of study designed to introduce you to Pacific cultures, values and traditions. You will also gain an understanding of some of the current issues faced by developing countries and by Pacific communities in the Pacific as well as in New Zealand.

Whether you're a community service worker looking to improve your cultural awareness, or a Pasifika student looking to ease into tertiary study, our entry-level Certificate in Pacific Development is an ideal choice.

### RELEVANT TO THE CULTURALLY DIVERSE NATURE OF NEW ZEALAND

This course is designed for both Pasifika and non-Pasifika people providing academic grounding in Pacific worldviews, and exploring the issues often faced by Pasifika communities. Your understanding of self and others will be a significant asset for thriving in a multi-cultural world.

## STAIRCASING TO A DEGREE

The Certificate may be awarded when you've completed the required papers or a transcript may be requested from the University as evidence that the qualification has been completed and you wish to continue work towards the Bachelor of Arts, Bachelor of Health Science or Bachelor of Social Work.

## CERTIFICATE STRUCTURE

You begin your programme with the compulsory paper:

### **230.102 Pacific Peoples in New Zealand**

An introduction to the distinctive cultures and history of Pacific Peoples in New Zealand. Students will develop an understanding of core values, traditions, cultural protocols, social processes and world views that are characteristic of Pacific cultures in the New Zealand context.

You also select three papers from the following list:

### **131.121 Rich World, Poor World**

This paper introduces students to the field of development studies and to some of the most pressing issues for people living in 'developing' countries. It steers a course between theory and practice and uses case studies from many parts of the world. Key themes are debt, refugees and famine.

### **146.102 Endangered Cultures**

The impact of modern civilisation on indigenous peoples.

Through a set of ethnographic case studies, exploration of Fourth World peoples' experiences of conquest, colonisation, culture change, assimilation, social disintegration, ethnocide, ecocide, modernisation and economic development, and the indigenous movements they have developed in their struggles to survive and preserve their cultures.

### **172.132 Language and Culture**

An introductory study of the relationships between language and culture.

### **179.110 Introducing Social and Community Work Practice**

An introduction to personal and social services with particular emphasis on social and community work practice.

### **179.230 Wellbeing of Pacific Peoples in New Zealand**

An examination of social policy and social service delivery issues from the perspective of Pacific cultures, communities in New Zealand. The paper will explore Pacific approaches to immigration, health, housing, justice, employment, education and social welfare needs.

### **230.100 Introduction to Academic Writing**

This paper is designed to help students in any discipline, and especially those studying within the humanities and social sciences, to write effectively at undergraduate level. While academic writing is the paper's main focus, students will practice a variety of writing tasks, including researched writing. Further, they will learn skills which can be used in many other contexts, both creative and practical. Students will practise revising their own and reviewing others' writing.

## ENTRY TO TEACHING PROGRAMMES

There are three aspects to enrolment for teaching students:

- > Admission to the University
- > Selection into the programme
- > Enrolment for the papers.

## ADMISSION TO THE UNIVERSITY

Before enrolment in teaching programmes can be confirmed, applicants must meet the standard criteria for entry to university. Please refer to specific entry requirements for each programme.

## THE SELECTION PROCESS

To begin a course of study in teaching, you will need to apply by completing an application form. Applications close in the first week of December. Once your application has been received, the first part of the selection process involves assessment by academic staff. If the staff feel you potentially meet the 'fit character' and 'fit to be a teacher' criteria, you will be invited to an interview. This is the second part of the selection process.

The interview focuses on the following criteria:

- > Fitness for teaching
- > Communication skills
- > Achievement and potential for professional full-time study
- > Awareness of teaching and learning
- > Interests and life experiences.

If the interview panel is satisfied you are a suitable candidate for a teacher education programme you may be offered a place, depending on availability.

## THE ENROLMENT PROCESS

Once you have accepted your offer of place for a teaching or Bachelor of Speech and Language Therapy programme you'll be enrolled into your papers and programme as outlined in the Letter of Offer.

## UNDERGRADUATE PATHWAYS TO TEACHING

## ADDITIONAL REQUIREMENTS

### DISCLOSURE OF CRIMINAL CONVICTIONS

You are required to disclose any convictions and you are required, in your application, to permit Massey University to ask the New Zealand Police to disclose any information held on the police record system.

If you have lived in any other country other than New Zealand for a period of 12 months or more in the last 10 years you will be required to supply a police certificate from that country.

### OVERSEAS QUALIFICATIONS

For teaching programmes requiring a bachelor's degree as a prerequisite, applicants with qualifications obtained overseas must have these assessed by the New Zealand Qualifications Authority (NZQA) to determine comparability with New Zealand qualifications. The NZQA Assessment must be provided with the completed selected entry application.

Assessments dated prior to 2008 will normally not be accepted and applicants will be assessed on an individual basis and may be advised to re-apply to NZQA. NZQA accreditation can take up to 35 working days. For more information on applying to NZQA please refer to: [www.nzqa.govt.nz](http://www.nzqa.govt.nz)

### ENGLISH LANGUAGE REQUIREMENTS

If your first language is not English, and you do not hold a degree (Level 7 or higher) from either a New Zealand or Australian tertiary education organisation you will need to attach a verified copy of your results in the form of an Academic IELTS test. The IELTS test must have a score of at least 7.0 or higher in all bands of the test. If you're a teacher who has registered with the New Zealand Teachers Council and hold a current

Practising Certificate, you are exempt from meeting this English Language IELTS requirement.

If you have studied in New Zealand for a minimum of two years at secondary school, and have eight, Level 2 NCEA university entrance literacy credits (four credits in reading and four credits in writing), you are exempt from the requirement to meet an IELTS assessment.

### TEACHING PRACTICA

All our teaching programmes require practica to be completed in a school or early childhood setting. Or, if you're doing your practica towards the Te Aho Tātaiarangi: Bachelor of Teaching Māori Medium/Diploma in Māori Education qualification, then in a kura kaupapa, Māori language immersion or bilingual classroom. Institute of Education Practicum Administrators will arrange the placements. Students experience a range of placements spread throughout their programme.

Note: Travel for practica is the responsibility of the student. You may need to travel an hour or more to placements.

Claire is having an impact on Kivi kids' day-to-day pre-school care through her work in literacy and learning.

"I get a great deal of pleasure from seeing children develop greater understandings of literacy because their teachers have increased opportunities and experiences for them as a result of our research. Development is incredibly rapid in children under the age of five and so it's often possible to see change within a day or a week. The neural pathways in the brain are laid down in this period and so the experiences that children have are of primary importance because they will shape thinking and behaviour for the rest of the child's life. I can honestly say that I am never bored and I am always interested to see what the day will hold."

The goal of this programme is to provide a professional Māori medium initial teacher education course of study to meet the needs of kura kaupapa Māori.

## SELECTION, ENTRY AND ADMISSION REQUIREMENTS

As part of the selection process for this programme you will be assessed by academic staff and members of Te Runanganui o ngā Kura Kaupapa Māori. If you have the relevant qualifications and experience, you will be invited to an interview. Interviews for the Te Aho Tātairangi programme are conducted in Māori. Potential students for this programme must be fluent in Te Reo Māori, such that they can sustain learning in a total immersion Māori environment. Depending on your qualifications, you'll be asked to undertake Māori language and mathematics tests.

If you are aged 20 and over you must have evidence or be able to demonstrate prior success at tertiary (Level 5 or above) study.

If you are under 20, you must have the following:

- > At least 14 credits at Level 3 or higher in each of two subjects from the approved list, plus a further 14 credits at Level 3 or higher from no more than two additional approved subjects or domains on the National Qualifications Framework (NQF);
- > At least 14 credits at Level 1 or higher in Mathematics on the NQF;

- > At least 4 credits in Reading and 4 credits in Writing in level 2 or higher in English or Te Reo Maori on the NQF. These literacy credits must be from a schedule of approved achievement and unit standards.
- > Te Reo Rangatira NCEA Level 3.

## PROGRAMME DELIVERY

The Te Aho Tātairangi: BTchgMāoriMed/DipMāoriEd programme focuses on four knowledge areas of study:

- > Te Ira Tangata – contextual studies
- > Te Ao Tangata – professional studies for teaching
- > Te Mana o Te Reo – content knowledge such as in the areas of language, numeracy and literacy
- > Te Ao Ako – integrated subject studies.

# BACHELOR OF SPEECH AND LANGUAGE THERAPY

Difficulties with speech, language and thought processes, or swallowing can be a serious impediment to communication and a person's ability to effectively function in society. Speech-language therapists assess and treat people with these types of problems, helping them through frustrating times to make improvements to their daily lives.

### WHAT'S IT LIKE?

The Speech and Language Therapy programme is a four-year professional degree, a combination of academic coursework and supervised clinical experience in speech and language therapy. Disorders studied include language disorders, phonological and articulation disorders, fluency, voice, motor speech, aphasia, and swallowing (dysphagia) disorders. The programme addresses cultural issues associated with speech-language therapy and includes at least 200 hours of clinical practice. Students work alongside practising speech-language therapists to gain clinical hours in a wide range of settings such as schools, rehabilitation centres, child development services, and community settings. Practicums occur within the Auckland region and nationwide.

### ENTRY REQUIREMENTS

Entry to the Bachelor of Speech and Language Therapy is by Selected Entry.

You must meet the undergraduate admission requirements and have achieved a minimum of 16 credits or more at NCEA Level 3 in one of the following subjects: biology, chemistry, mathematics with calculus, physics, science or statistics and 14 credits or more at Level 3 or higher in three approved subjects including English; or hold a B Bursary or higher in the University Entrance Bursaries and Scholarships examination; or have a recognised alternative, such as work completed towards a tertiary degree or equivalent entry qualification.

Selection will also be based on your application and an interview. The interview includes meeting staff, interactions with clients, completing a self-reflection of client interactions and a written exercise.

### PLANNING YOUR DEGREE

All papers in the Bachelor of Speech and Language therapy are specialised and compulsory, with fieldwork practicums starting from year two of the degree.

It is an intensive program made up of compulsory papers, all of which contribute to your ability to assess and treat children and adults with communication and/or swallowing disorders.

All of the teachers I encountered at Massey were very professional and knowledgeable in their specialist areas. They had all worked, or were still working in a clinical capacity as well as teaching, so were able to teach from a real-life as well as theoretical perspective.

I graduated in 2011, and I currently work as a speech and language therapist at North Shore Hospital in Auckland, where I assess and treat adults with communication and/or swallowing disorders.

# BACHELOR OF EDUCATION

## BEd

Massey University's Bachelor of Education degree is one of New Zealand's longest-standing and most respected professional qualifications for teachers, tutors and educators.

The programme is relevant for practising teachers in early childhood settings, primary and secondary schools, polytechnics and other community-based educational settings.

Generous credit provisions are available for registered teachers seeking to upgrade their Diploma of Teaching to degree status.

**NOTE:** The Bachelor of Education degree is not a pathway to teacher registration. Students seeking registration as a teacher should hold an undergraduate degree and apply for a Graduate Diploma of Teaching qualification or the Master of Teaching and Learning.

## ENTRY REQUIREMENTS

Students shall hold a New Zealand Diploma or Higher Diploma of Teaching, or an approved equivalent; or have completed at least two full-time years of approved relevant experience in an educational context, or approved equivalent to gain admission into the Bachelor of Education degree. Student must also have entrance to university to gain admission into Massey University.

## PROGRAMME STRUCTURE

The Bachelor of Education is made up of three schedules. Schedule A comprises the compulsory core papers directly allied to education. Schedule B comprises papers for your chosen major, and Schedule C comprises other education papers. Students can also choose 75 credits of elective papers from any subject area across the University.

Papers in the BEd schedules are each worth 15 credits. One year of full-time study is equivalent to 120 credits. The Bachelor of Education may be completed with or without a major. The majors available are:

- > Early Years Education
- > Special and Inclusive Education
- > Teaching English to Speakers of Other Languages

Students awarded credit shall follow an approved course of study consisting of at least 120 credits, including the requirements of at least one major.

**NOTE:** An offer of credit for 90 or more credits towards the BEd degree would generally include a waiver for prerequisites for all 300-level education papers except where specific prerequisite papers are mentioned.
