

Bicultural Focus in the School of Psychology

As part of Massey University's commitment to Te Tiriti o Waitangi (the Treaty of Waitangi), the School of Psychology is developing a bicultural focus as an integral part of the qualifications offered.

The **Centre for Indigenous Psychologies** and Māori staff have an important role in facilitating the development of this focus within the School. We provide dedicated Māori resource rooms and study spaces and tutorials for Māori and Pacific students.

Bicultural perspectives are central to our Indigenous Psychologies programme. Students can complete a minor or a diploma in Indigenous Psychologies or they can incorporate any of our three indigenous psychology courses into their degrees. Our course, **Ngā Tirohanga Rua o te Taha Hinengaro: Bicultural Perspectives in Psychology** in particular focuses on the bicultural nature of psychology.

We expect that all participants in our qualifications (both staff and students) will recognise that Psychology has an on-going responsibility, through teaching and research qualifications, to promote genuine Māori participation in the discipline in a manner consistent with Māori aspirations and processes. We anticipate building our capacity for bicultural knowledge and practice through active involvement of all staff and students.





For thesis or research projects, you need to be enrolled continuously until you submit your completed thesis or project.

Overview of Postgraduate Pathways





Compulsory requirements

Rule No. 1:

You NEED to have an undergraduate degree majoring in psychology to do postgraduate qualifications or courses in the School of Psychology.

If you do not have a major in psychology, there is still a way to go about it.

You can enrol in the Graduate Diploma in Arts or Graduate Diploma in Science and Technology, at Massey University and take eight (8) undergraduate courses (120 credits) which will give you the equivalent of a Psychology major. You should be able to complete it in one (1) year studying full-time.

Rule No. 2:

You NEED to satisfy all entry requirements including the minimum grades required.

If you do not have these, there is still a way to go about it.

You can enrol in the Certificate of Proficiency Undergraduate (CPUND) to a maximum of four undergraduate courses (60 credits) or Certificate of Proficiency Postgraduate (CoP Postgraduate) to a maximum of two postgraduate courses (30 credits) at Massey University which may help you to raise your grades.

You may take the CoP at undergraduate level to try to raise your undergraduate grade average to enter a postgraduate qualification. The CoP at postgraduate level may be a way to improve your postgraduate grade average to progress, for example to part 2 of a Masters degree. You may find more information here:

Specialisations in Psychology

Psychology is a very diverse discipline with many different specialisations. Undergraduate psychology degrees are designed to give students a broad overview of the discipline. At postgraduate level many students decide to specialise in one area of psychology. The School of Psychology offers postgraduate students defined schemes of study in three applied areas: Industrial/Organisational (I/O) Psychology, Health Psychology, and Clinical Psychology. Students can also focus on Critical Psychology, Experimental Psychology, and Disaster Management.

Students do not have to specialise and are free to select their courses from the full range of 700 level courses within the Honours / Masters list.

Industrial/Organisational (I/O) Psychology

What is Industrial / Organisational Psychology?

Industrial / Organisational Psychology, sometimes referred to as Work Psychology, Organisational Psychology, or Occupational Psychology, applies psychological theories, principles and models to organisations and people who are or who want to be in work. Industrial / Organisational psychologists contribute to organisational and employee success through a wide range of activities such as career guidance and support, coaching, recruitment and selection, employee engagement, organisational change, team and leadership development, motivation, job satisfaction, health and safety in the workplace, and the overall health and wellbeing of employees.

There is a free online practitioner community called IONet which students are welcome to join, and the Industrial Organisational Special Interest Group (IOSIG) hosts regular events in Auckland and Christchurch which are also open

for students to attend at a discounted rate. Membership of IONet and attendance at events are wonderful opportunities for students to network with practitioners. In addition, job opportunities are regularly posted to IOnet, so interested students should join to take advantage of those opportunities when they arise.

The Health Psychology Pathway

What is Health Psychology?

Health Psychology seeks to understand the psychological processes underlying health and illness and to apply this knowledge to enhance health, improve health care and develop health-related policies. It can be applied across the lifespan, to the promotion of health, prevention of illness and to improving outcomes for those who are ill. Massey recently celebrated 30 years of Health Psychology, making this one of the most established Health Psychology programmes in the country.

Health Psychology consists of various pathways: Health psychology as primary focus; health psychology with policy options; health psychology with organisational focus; and health psychology with options to support professional practice training. The Clinical Psychology Pathway

Introduction to Clinical Psychology Training

The Clinical Psychology Training Programme consists of the Master of Clinical Psychology and Doctor of Clinical Psychology qualifications. These qualifications provide training that leads to the professional identity of a clinical psychologist. Training is currently offered at the Manawatū, Albany, and Wellington campuses.

The courses offered reflect our School's commitment to incorporating a range of perspectives. The staff involved in clinical psychology training have a wide range of experience and interests, and approach clinical work from different theoretical frameworks. It is hoped that during their involvement in training, students will formulate an approach to understanding human behaviour which has a strong theoretical base and which can serve as a guide in their professional career. Clinical training is based on the scientist-practitioner model, which emphasises the need for clinical psychologists to have a strong research background as well as clinical skills. We also have a commitment to the principles embodied in the Treaty of Waitangi and aim to produce clinicians who are sensitive to the needs of people from diverse backgrounds and across the lifespan.

Clinical Psychology Training at Massey University, in common with most clinical training in New Zealand, aims to produce clinicians capable of working in any clinical setting. For this reason the qualifications require a broad base of experience rather than a focus on particular speciality areas.

Successful completion of Clinical Psychology training leads to the professional identity of a clinical psychologist. Massey University offers two pathways to registration in clinical psychology, the clinical doctorate (DClinPsych) and the Master of Clinical Psychology (MClinPsych).

To be accepted into the DClinPsych qualification, students must have completed EITHER an Honours OR Masters degree with a 120 credit thesis (Research pathway) OR Masters degree with a 180 credit (Coursework pathway) and which includes the pre-requisite courses, and met the grade average requirement. The DClinPsych is a three year full-time course of study.

To be accepted into the MClinPsych qualification, students must have already completed EITHER a 240 credit Masters degree which includes a 120 credit thesis OR a PhD in Psychology, including the pre-requisite courses. The MClinPsych is a two-year course of study.

Admission to Clinical Psychology Training is decided by a Selection Committee. The competitive selection process will normally occur towards the end of the Honours OR Masters year. However, occasionally provisional admission to the Clinical Programme can occur after the completion of the Bachelors degree.

The Postgraduate Diploma in **Psychological Practice**

This qualification offers a pathway to registration, and includes an internship that enables you to meet the competency requirements to be eligible for registration to practise under the Psychologist Scope of Practice. However, it does not include clinical psychology training.

To apply, students must have completed a minimum of 180 credits of postgraduate study, including a thesis of at least 90 credits, postgraduate courses of at least 90 credits, with a minimum of B+ grade average.

Other Focus Areas in Psychology

Critical Psychology

Critical psychology investigates how individuals' thoughts, emotions, and actions are shaped by their cultural, social, and historical contexts, while also examining the interactions between knowledge and power in society. It is one of the strengths of our postgraduate programme. Key courses

include: 175.718 Postmodernism and Psychology, 175.720 Advanced Psychology of Women; 175.743 Health: The Social Context, 175.739 Health Psychology: Understanding Health and Illness, 175.744 Health Psychology: Promoting Health; 175.725 Advanced Social Psychology, and 175.750 Qualitative Methods in Psychology. Staff in the school also supervise a range of critical thesis topics at the Honours, Masters and PhD levels. Critical psychology encompasses both scholarly criticisms and applied endeavours to addresses a range of social issues.

Experimental Psychology

Research in experimental psychology tends to be theorydriven, meaning researchers are interested in building and testing explanations for psychological phenomena, improving our understanding of human nature and developing evidencebased practices within psychology and related disciplines (e.g., education, public health). The experimental psychologists at Massey are a friendly bunch who have research strengths in the areas of affective neuroscience, cognition, and social psychology. They actively collaborate with a variety of other disciplines including public health, sports and exercise science, food and nutrition, education, and biological sciences.

Students who wish to focus on experimental psychology for their Honours or Masters degree should consider taking 175.746 *Psychological Research: Quantitative Data Analysis.* In addition to coursework, the experimental psychology staff encourage students to develop practical research skills and professional proficiencies through our regular seminars, research meetings, and attendance at academic conferences.

Postgraduate qualifications in Psychology

Important Notes

Research Supervision

Honours and Masters degrees in Psychology include a research component. ALL students who are planning to do Honours or Masters research are encouraged to begin looking for potential supervisors for their research projects and theses as soon as is practical. The School may not always be able to provide supervision in a topic area or to provide a specific staff member for supervision of a project or thesis.

Progression to training qualifications for registration as a psychologist

A Masters degree of 180 credits does not generally meet the entry criteria for professional training qualifications such as the Master of Clinical Psychology.

If you are looking to progress to a training qualification which will lead to registration as a psychologist, you will generally need to do 240 credits of postgraduate study.

This could, for example, be a Master of Science in Psychology (240 credits), or a Postgraduate Diploma in Arts, Science and Technology, or Health Science (120) credits) followed by a Masters by thesis only for a total of 240 credits.

Honours Degrees BA (Hons) / BSc (Hons)

The BA (Hons) or BSc (Hons) in Psychology take one-year of full-time study or can be spread over two or three years of part-time study. Honours students complete courses to the value of 90 credits (including 175.738 Psychological Research: Principles of Design) from the list of 700 level psychology courses, and a research report (175.799 Research report) of 30 credits. Students can progress to a Masters degree by thesis only, if they meet the grade average requirement.

The research report component of Honours details the outcome of an empirical investigation conducted by the student with supervision by a staff member from the School of Psychology. The investigation may deal with original research, or may be a replication.

The research carried out within the Honours degree is sufficient for students to progress to a PhD in Psychology so long as they achieve at least Second Class (Division I) Honours.

Postgraduate Certificates (PGCertArts / PGCertScTech)

The Postgraduate Certificates are a good way to discover whether postgraduate study is right for you. They are equivalent to the first half of a Postgraduate Diploma.

They are a great place to start if you're considering postgraduate study. You will be taking four (4) courses (60 credits) which can be completed in 6 months full-time, or up to 2 years part time.

Postgraduate Diplomas (PGDipArts / PGDipScTech / PGDipHlthSc)

These are advanced qualifications in psychology. They do not have a research component. Students take 120 credits of 700-level psychology courses.

(NOTE: 175.738 Psychological Research: Principles of Design is **compulsory** for **ALL** students and 175.799 *Research report* cannot be taken as part of a Postgraduate Diploma).

A postgraduate diploma can be completed in one year fulltime or up to four years part-time.

Masters Degrees (MA, MSc, MHlthSc)

ALL students are encouraged to begin looking for potential supervisors for their research projects and theses as soon as is practical. The School may not always be able to provide supervision in a topic area or to provide a specific staff member for supervision of a project or thesis.

Students who enrol for a thesis or research report course must have a supervisor arranged and an Agreement to Supervise form (available at https://www.massey.ac.nz/ about/colleges-schools-and-institutes/college-of-humanitiesand-social-sciences/research-in-the-college-of-humanitiesand-social-sciences/psychology-research/psychology-thesistopics-and-supervisors/) completed before their enrolment will be approved.

Master of Arts (MA)

The MA in Psychology comprises 180 credits. It is a 1.5 year qualification of full-time study but may be completed parttime. MA students complete 700 level psychology courses (including 175.738 Psychological Research: Principles of Design), and a research report or thesis.

Two options are available: a coursework pathway with a smaller research component and a research pathway with a larger research component. All requirements must be completed within four years.

The *coursework* pathway comprises:

- 120 credits of 700-level courses
- a 60-credit research report.

The research pathway comprises:

- 60 credits of 700-level courses
- Thesis Part I (60 credits) and Thesis Part II (60 credits).

Master of Science (MSc)

The MSc in Psychology is a two-year qualification of full-time study (but may be completed part-time). Masters students complete 120 credits of 700-level psychology courses (including 175.738 Psychological Research: Principles of Design) in the first year, and a thesis of 120 credits in the second year. Students interested in the Health Psychology endorsement must enrol in the MSc qualification with any Psychology Bachelor's degrees or equivalent.



Master of Science (Health Psychology)

Health psychology is the application of psychological knowledge to understanding the experience of health and illness, what is good health care, and how to improve health promotion and health-related policies.

Massey's MSc (Psychology - Health Psychology) addresses these goals with a broad view of health and wellbeing that integrates theory, research, and practice. Students develop strong understandings of the interactions between biological, psychological, social, economic, and cultural aspects of health and wellbeing and how these might be harnessed to improve health outcomes.

The MSc (Psychology - Health Psychology) is right for you if you plan to work in health, public health, or community settings. What you will learn in this qualification has both research and practical applications, including those supporting Māori, Pasifika and the diverse communities in Aotearoa New Zealand.

Master of Health Science (Psychology)

The Master of Health Science offers you an opportunity to pursue research through advanced studies in a specialised subject. The Postgraduate Diploma in Psychological Practice

The Postgraduate Diploma in Psychological Practice (PGDipPsychPrac) provides a professional qualification to prepare interns to register under the Psychologist scope of the Health Practitioners Competence Assurance (HPCA) Act.

Registered psychologists work in a variety of applied settings. This qualification is ideal for mature students who have relevant workplace experience and academic preparation matched to their intended career path. A broad range of possibilities exist for internships under this qualification.

Students intending to proceed to the Postgraduate Diploma in Psychological Practice must have completed 180 credits of postgraduate study, including a thesis of at least 90 credits.

Doctoral Degrees

Doctor of Philosophy (PhD)

The PhD degree is an advanced research degree. Candidates are engaged in research for the duration of the qualification. There is no course work unless specified by the supervisor during the first year of provisional enrolment. Candidates may be granted permission to be employed in a full-time job, provided that the job allows the candidate to continue studies and research. Normally, the consent of both the candidate's employer and the University's Doctoral Research Committee is required and candidates will be required to enrol part-time.

The prerequisite for entry is normally an Honours or Masters degree in Psychology, of First Class or Second Class (Division I) standard. Applicants must arrange supervision and approval before applying to the University Doctoral Research Committee.

Generally, students accepted into this qualification will be given provisional enrolment for the first year and are required to complete specified work. Intending PhD students should apply to the Massey University Doctoral Research Committee.

Frequently **Asked Questions**

Please remember that acceptance into Honours, Postgraduate Diploma, or Masters Qualifications does not guarantee that you will be able to study all of the specific courses that you choose. Several 700 level courses in the School of Psychology have a limited number of places. The clinical courses in particular have restricted numbers and students selected into the Clinical Training programme will have places reserved in these courses.

1. Which Postgraduate Qualifications in Psychology allow me to become a registered psychologist?

The Doctor of Clinical Psychology, Master in Clinical Psychology, and Postgraduate Diploma in Psychological Practice offer pathways towards registration as a psychologist. All require that a previous postgraduate qualification is completed first, to a high standard.

2. I do not have a major in Psychology, or its equivalent. What can I do if I want to pursue a postgraduate qualification in Psychology at Massey?

You can enrol in the Graduate Diploma in Arts or Graduate Diploma in Science and Technology at Massey University and take eight undergraduate courses (120 credits) which will give you the equivalent of a Psychology major.

3. I think I have the equivalent of a major in Psychology, but I'm unsure. What can I do?

If you send a cover letter and a copy of your university transcripts to our specialist academic advisors for psychology, they will review your transcripts and advise on a suitable pathway. It is vital that you send queries well in advance of University deadlines for enrolment and do not expect a reply in less than three (3) weeks.

4. I only wish to take a few courses in Psychology, either as part of another degree or to enhance my professional training. Is this possible?

You still need a major in psychology, even if you only want to do one or a few postgraduate psychology courses. If you are studying for another postgraduate degree, and you do have a major in psychology, you may be able to take some postgraduate courses within the School of Psychology. This can be arranged by writing a letter to the Postgraduate Co-ordinator detailing your qualifications and reasons for wishing to take the particular course(s). Written requests to take courses for interest or as part of a degree from another university should arrive at the School well in advance of the University deadlines for enrolment.

5. I have a first-class Honours for my Bachelor of Arts/Science in Psychology. Can I enrol in a PhD without doing a Masters degree?

This may be possible if you have an Honours or Masters degree with First Class or Second Class (division one) Honours, or a B+ average. However, you need to make sure that you have completed a research project, dissertation, or thesis of at least 30 credits or a minimum of 25% of your honours or master's degree, with a B+ or higher grade.

6. Must I enclose a transcript with my application for postgraduate study?

If you are a Massey University graduate and supply us with your student ID number, we will retrieve your transcript for you for the application review process. If you are not a Massey University graduate, you must supply an original or verified copy of your university transcript(s) when prompted to on enrolment.

7. Should I enclose a resumé, CV or other details about my qualifications?

The main information required is academic-related information (i.e., academic grades, gualifications, honours, etc.) Hence, a transcript is sufficient for our purposes and additional documentation should not be sent. However, if you have been away from academic study for some time, it may be quite important to list any recent academic work, certification classes, and so on, when you apply.

8. How are applicants chosen for the postgraduate qualifications?

Applicants are chosen based on a weighted grade average formula. If you have questions about your grade average, please contact the postgraduate administrator.

If you are admitted to a postgraduate qualification, you are not necessarily guaranteed a place in your preferred courses or quaranteed your preferred thesis supervisor. This is because our postgraduate class size for many courses is limited, and we have only a finite number of staff available to provide research supervision. So, if you are planning to a qualification that has a research component (i.e., Honours or Masters) please search for your supervisor as soon as possible so you can plan your postgraduate qualification.

9. What if I am unsuccessful?

Unsuccessful applications usually happen when entry requirements were not met. You may wish to consider taking additional undergraduate courses under a Certificate of Proficiency to increase your grade average. Many students who were initially unsuccessful in their application have later been admitted for postgraduate study after taking additional courses and performing well. However, taking such courses offers no guarantee of acceptance into a qualification the following year.

10. I wish to study educational psychology and possibly become an educational psychologist one day. Does the School of Psychology offer that?

Massey University offers educational psychology but it's not run by the School of Psychology. Qualifications relating to education and learning are run by the Institute of Education, you may refer to https://www.massey.ac.nz/about/collegesschools-and-institutes/college-of-humanities-and-social-sciences/institute-of-education/.

11. Do you have counselling psychology qualifications?

Massey University offers a Master of Counselling Studies which is accredited by the New Zealand Association of Counsellors (NZAC). It is not run by under the School of Psychology and does not lead to registration as a psychologist. You may refer to https://www.massey.ac.nz/study/all-qualifications-and-degrees/master-of-counselling-studies-PMCNS/. Massey does not offer a Counselling Psychology qualification, although we offer PGDipPsychPrac which is a registration pathway.

12. Can I study part-time?

You can study part-time for most diplomas & degrees at the postgraduate level. Students wishing to enrol part-time should be mindful of the time frames to complete postgraduate study. Please note that the Doctor of Clinical Psychology can only be undertaken on a full-time basis.

13. Can I study from off-campus?

Most postgraduate courses are offered extramurally with no requirement for on-campus attendance. Some may include optional contact workshops. Please check the requirements for each of your courses.

Theses and research projects may also be completed at a distance. Supervision at a distance must involve regular contact with your supervisor, by phone, email and/or videoconference as well as occasional visits to your supervisor's campus if possible.

The Doctor of Clinical Psychology is a full-time programme of study which requires **compulsory weekly** attendance on-campus. It may only be taken by internal mode.

14. When should I start approaching staff members as my supervisor for my thesis research?

ALL prospective research students should begin looking for potential supervisors as soon as is practical. The School may not always be able to provide supervision in your preferred topic area or a specific staff member to supervise your project or thesis.

Students who enrol for a thesis or research report course must have a supervisor arranged and an Agreement to Supervise form (available at https://www.massey.ac.nz/about/colleges-schools-and-institutes/college-of-humanities-and-social-sciences/research-in-the-college-of-humanities-and-social-sciences/psychology-research/psychology-thesis-topics-and-supervisors/) completed before their enrolment will be approved.

You can begin study either in Semester 1 (begins in February) or Semester 2 (begins in July). You need to apply well in advance of the start of semester.

Signing up for study is a two-step process:

- 1. First you apply for **admission** to Massey to study a particular qualification. You will then have to wait until you receive an 'offer of place' in that qualification. Once you have accepted the 'offer of place' you can ...
- 2. Apply to **enrol** in your courses.
