In this second library newsletter for academic staff for 2025, we have important information about third-party copyright for Masters students and Doctoral candidates. We have also included details on forthcoming copyright workshops and other services offered by Library staff. The Library catalogue (Discover) now has a new search feature designed to improve the range of search results through offering natural language capability. This can be turned on by moving a toggle button at the top of your research results.

Prior to each meeting, college representatives on the Library Advisory Committee are asked to solicit feedback on the Library's services from college staff. We so appreciate the comments we receive, which are discussed and tabled at our meetings and which provide a means of critical reflection on the work and value of the Library. 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Third Party Copyright and Theses

Supervisors, Doctoral candidates and Masters students should be aware of the guidance provided regarding the inclusion of third party copyright content in theses:

Copyright and copyright transfer agreements

Third party copyright

Copyright and using images

Doctoral and Masters students must complete a <u>copyright declaration</u> when submitting their thesis. One option indicates the inclusion of third party content (images, diagrams, journal articles). Increasingly this is incorrectly completed, either indicating there is some third party content used without permission but without providing a list or saying there is no third party content when there is.







Until now, Library staff have reviewed all theses for copyright compliance before up loading to Massey Research Online and contacted the student. Due to increasing non-compliance, this is no longer sustainable and one of the following strategies is used:

- Redact (remove) the images. Captions are left, which often have an URL to the content.
- Invite copyright holders to use the <u>Copyright takedown link</u> in the MRO footer to request removal of the copyrighted material.
- Invoke section 42 of the Copyright Act, which allows use of illustrations for purpose of criticism and review. This option is often used with CoCA theses.

Discover's New Natural Language Search

Discover now offers an AI-powered 'natural language' search option. This means that searchers can enter a phrase or question instead of the keywords the Library usually recommends for an effective search.

All is only being used to enhance the relevance of the search results, so there is no need to declare it when submitting assignments.
