Focus

Agribusiness, Accountancy

Level of Study

Undergraduate, Third year

Purpose

The purpose of the Ted Delahunty Accountancy and Agribusiness Bursary is to provide support for agribusiness and accountancy students facing financial hardship.

Background

The Ted Delahunty Accountancy and Agribusiness Bursary was established by the Ted Delahunty Trust. Mr Delahunty was a senior lecturer in Massey University's School of Accounting and Finance from 1978 to 1986. On his retirement, he established the Ted Delahunty Trust to provide education and research into accounting and other business activities for the land-based primary industry. Mr Delahunty passed away in 2015.

Value and Tenure

The value of the bursary is up to \$10,000 per annum for full-time students; prorated for part-time students.

The bursary is awarded annually, and the tenure is a single academic year.

Typical Number on Offer

One bursary is typically offered each year; however the selection committee may award further scholarships at their discretion.

Eligibility

Applicants must be:

- New Zealand citizens or permanent residents

- enrolled full time or part time in their final year of study in the Bachelor of Agribusiness, the Bachelor of Accountancy, or the Bachelor of Business (Accountancy), internally on the Manawatū campus, Massey University

Selection Criteria

The selection is primarily based on financial hardship, which is assessed through an income and expense budget submitted by the applicant.

Academic merit and evidence of good citizenship may also be taken into consideration.

Selection Panel

The bursary is awarded by the University Scholarships Committee on the recommendation of the Trustees of the Delahunty Trust.

The selection panel has the right to refrain from making an award if there are no suitable applicants and its decision is final.

Conditions of the Bursary

The bursary is paid in two instalments.

The bursary may be held in conjunction with other scholarships, bursaries or awards, so long as those scholarships, bursaries or awards permit co-tenure.
