

SECURITY STUDIES @ MASSEY UNIVERSITY

Security Studies critically analyses the factors that influence perceptions of security and insecurity, their effect on the behaviour of individuals and groups, and the ways in which those in positions of power and responsibility respond to them. Rapid technological and social change has given rise to unique security challenges such as violent extremism, environmental degradation and information-system vulnerabilities. Such challenges have stretched the boundaries of the field far beyond its traditional limits, raising new questions about what security is and how (and for whom) it is to be pursued.

About the Security Studies Programme

The Security Studies programme brings together scholars and practitioners from a range of intellectual disciplines and professional fields to develop innovative approaches to the theory and practice of security. Engaging with our multidisciplinary team, students acquire the analytical tools for critical and constructive thinking about security as well as the practical know-how to apply the tools to real-world security challenges.

DEFENCE STUDIES @ MASSEY UNIVERSITY

The complexity of the global environment requires an understanding of defence issues broader than the study of war and human conflict. Contemporary approaches to Defence Studies extend beyond more traditional military topics with an exploration of the non-combat roles that military forces undertake such as humanitarian assistance, disaster relief and support to government agency operations, as well as examining the wider societal impact that the presence of a standing military force has within a state.

About the Defence Studies Programme

The Defence Studies programme examines how military forces seek to overcome the conceptual, strategic and operational challenges encountered in the expanded roles they are expected to fill. We focus on advancing the knowledge of military scholars, analysts and professionals by fostering critical perspectives on the nature and character of military operations as influenced and shaped by the political, social and technological fields of human endeavour.

Defence Studies is not just for people employed in the military, it is for anyone with an interest in military operations, conventional and irregular warfare, military history, strategy, policy or peacekeeping for example.

Careers in Defence Studies

There is an increasing need for defence professionals, both military and civilian. Employers are looking for people with the intelligence, initiative and determination to work in a wide range of complex defence environments. These roles are integral to the safety of New Zealand, and the demand for qualified people who can fill these is exceptionally strong.

CERTIFICATE IN ARTS

Structure

The Certificate consists of 60 credits (four courses), with at least 45 credits (three courses) coming from the Bachelor of Arts Schedule.

All credits can be taken from Defence and Security Studies undergraduate courses.

The Certificate can be completed in one semester of full-time study, or over a longer period of part-time study. Students who complete the Certificate in Arts can proceed to the Diploma in Arts or Bachelor of Arts if they wish.

How to Move to a Diploma?

When you have passed four courses for the Certificate in Arts you can continue on with your study but for your next enrolment you enrol under the Diploma in Arts. The four courses you completed for the Certificate are transferred to your Diploma.



DIPLOMA IN ARTS (SECURITY STUDIES)

Management of threats to security is an important dimension of government and public policy. If you are interested in local and global security issues, Massey's Diploma in Arts (Security Studies) will give you knowledge in this area.


This diploma offers early- to mid-career professional development to those working in public and private organisations where security is important. It is also open to any other students who wish to enrol.

REQUIREMENTS

The requirements for the Diploma in Arts endorsed in Security Studies are:

- **Pass the core courses:**
230.111 Tū Kupu: Writing and Inquiry 294.180 Introduction to Security Studies
230.112 Tū Arohae: Critical Thinking
- **Pass 75 credits (five courses, including 294.180) in Security Studies consisting of:** at least 45 credits (three courses) at 200- and 300-level in Security Studies 30 credits (two courses) at any level in Security Studies
- The remaining 30 credits (two courses) for the Diploma in Arts can be from Part II of the schedule for the Bachelor of Arts degree (including further courses from the security studies) and/or courses offered in defence studies or other undergraduate degrees.





DIPLOMA IN ARTS (DEFENCE STUDIES)

The Diploma in Arts (Defence Studies) is a unique programme that combines the study of modern defence studies and military history with broad and transferable critical-thinking skills.

REQUIREMENTS

The requirements for the Diploma in Arts endorsed in Defence Studies are:

- **Pass the core courses:**
230.111 Tū Kupu: Writing and Inquiry 294.115 War and Society
230.112 Tū Arohae: Critical Thinking
- **Pass 75 credits (five courses, including 294.115 War and Society in Defence Studies consisting of:** at least 45 credits (three courses) at 200- and 300-level in Defence Studies 30 credits (two courses) at any level in Defence Studies
- The remaining 30 credits (two courses) for the Diploma in Arts can be from Part II of the schedule for the Bachelor of Arts degree (including further courses in defence studies) and/or courses offered in security studies or other undergraduate degrees.

REQUIREMENTS

Security Studies is for anyone with an interest in security, for example, emerging security issues, global trade, border security, strategy, terrorism and political violence and policing.

Major Requirements

A major in Security Studies must include 294.180 Introduction to Security Studies, 2 courses at 200-level and 4 courses at 300-level.

Minor Requirements

A minor in Security Studies requires 5 courses, including the compulsory course and at least one course at 300-level.

You can choose several elective courses during your degree. These can also be taken from the Defence and Security Studies course schedule.

Double Major

It is also possible to study for a double major in Security Studies and Defence Studies.

Note – major, minor and elective course requirements are subject to regulatory approval before being offered in 2019.



BACHELOR OF ARTS (SECURITY STUDIES) MAJOR OR MINOR

The security studies programme is highly interdisciplinary. Your education will draw on the academic knowledge and professional experience of staff from across the University.

Bachelor Of Arts (Security Studies) Structure

You may know you have an interest in Security Studies but you are unsure about what courses might complement this interest or lead on to a second major, or minor.

Getting Started

The following list helps with planning your study. A usual full-time workload for first year is eight courses; four courses in semester one, and four courses in semester two. Alternatively part-time study would include one to three courses per semester.

BACHELOR OF ARTS (DEFENCE STUDIES)

MAJOR OR MINOR

You'll follow a unique programme that combines the study of contemporary defence studies with broad and transferable critical-thinking skills.

Our programme partners are government agencies that contribute to national, regional and global defence and security, as well as peace and humanitarian aid initiatives.

It is possible to have a great career in New Zealand or the international community, in a broad range of areas. There's increasing demand for defence professionals, both military and civilian. Employers are looking for people with the intelligence, initiative and determination to work in a wide range of complex defence environments.

You could work not just for the military, but also in areas such as public education, peacekeeping and intelligence. These roles are integral to the safety of New Zealand, and the demand for qualified people who can fill these is exceptionally strong.

Bachelor Of Arts (Defence Studies) Structure

You can begin your major by choosing from a number of 100-level courses in Defence Studies. These courses look at areas such as war and society, military power and the history of warfare. Select your first-year courses from the ones available in the year you want to begin your major.

Getting Started

You may know you have an interest in Defence Studies but you are unsure about what courses might complement this interest or lead on to a second major, or minor.

A usual full-time workload for first year is eight courses; four courses in Semester One, and four courses in Semester Two. Alternatively part-time study would include one to three courses per semester.

REQUIREMENTS

Defence Studies is not just for people employed in the military, it is for anyone with an interest in defence studies, for example, conventional warfare, irregular warfare, global defence challenges, peacekeeping and cyber-security.

Major Requirements

A major in Defence Studies must include 2 courses at 100-level (including 294.115 War and Society), 2 courses at 200-level and 4 courses at 300-level.

You can choose several elective courses during your degree. These can also be taken from the Defence and Security Studies course schedule.

Minor Requirements

A minor in Defence Studies requires 5 courses, including the compulsory courses and at least one course at 300-level.

Double Major

It is also possible to study for a double major in Defence Studies and Security Studies.

Note – major, minor and elective course requirements are subject to regulatory approval before being offered in 2019.





BACHELOR OF ARTS (DEFENCE AND SECURITY STUDIES) WITH HONOURS

The core of this specialised programme is the contemporary world of modern defence and security, including the impact on media, technology and conflict resolution at local and global levels.

THE ONLY HONOURS DEGREE OF ITS TYPE IN NEW ZEALAND

Massey offers New Zealand's only specialist education in defence and security studies. If you want to go on to postgraduate study, it serves as a pathway to a higher research degree.

ENTRY REQUIREMENTS

Admission to this programme is open to students who have completed one of the following:

- A Bachelor of Arts degree with a major in Defence or Security Studies or close equivalent;
- A Bachelor of Arts degree with a minor in Defence or Security Studies, followed by a Graduate Certificate in Arts endorsed in Defence or Security Studies;
- A Bachelor of Arts degree followed by a Graduate Diploma of Arts in Defence or Security Studies. Students must have achieved at least a B grade average over the 200 and 300-level courses in Defence or Security Studies;
- *Or* a relevant related undergraduate qualification.



Bachelor Of Arts With Honours (Defence and Security Studies) Structure

The programme consists of 120 credits of 700-level courses from the BA (Hons) Defence and Security Studies schedule, with a research report taken as the final course.

This qualification will be awarded with a class of Honours.

Requirements

All requirements must be completed within one year for full-time study or within three years for part-time study.

- 294.711 Theories in Defence and Security
- 294.790 Research Methods in Defence and Security
- 294.798 Research Report (30 credits)

and
further 30 credits from the 700-level Defence and Security Studies course schedule.

or 294.798 and the further 30 credits at 700-level can be substituted with a 60 credit Research Report
