Also, the end of semester exams are usually worth 40% instead of 60%. Lecturers are very helpful and will assign you extra credit projects if you ask for them. Each class is usually held 3 times a week (MWF) or 2 times a week (T,TH).
- Did you stay on-campus or off-campus? What was the accommodation like? I stayed on campus during my first semester, however I moved off campus in my second semester. It was quite common for exchange students to live off campus at my University, however a car was recommended. Accommodation on campus is your typical dormitory which is shared with a room mate. While living off campus you can have your own room and cooking facilities.

How did living expenses compare to in New Zealand?

Living on campus is quite expensive per semester, however meal plans can be purchased also to take the hassle out of cooking.
